Course Description and Overview: An introduction to the scientific study of personality which will consider theory, assessment and research in five approaches to personality: psychodynamic, biological, trait, behavioral and humanistic. Students are encouraged to think critically about the topics presented and expected to engage in relevant class discussions.

Prerequisites: PSYCH 1A03, 1AA3; or registration in Honours Biology and Psychology or the Bachelor of Health Sciences (Honours) program

Evaluation: Evaluation will be based on two in-class exams and one final exam. The form of the exams will be multiple choice and short answer. The final exam will be **CUMULATIVE** and will take place on the last day of classes.
