Course Content and Objectives: In this course we will (1) explore psychological theories relevant to teaching and learning, and (2) discuss how these theories might be used in the classroom. We will explore a variety of theoretical perspectives that, although not originally developed by educational psychologists, apply well to the problems faced by educators.

Evaluation: Three exams (two midterms and a final), consisting of some combination of multiple-choice items and short essays (subject to change if circumstances warrant). These will cover lecture material *and* assigned readings, even readings not discussed in class. Each midterm is worth 30% of your final grade; the final exam is worth 40% of your final grade. The midterms will be held on Weds Oct 10th and Weds Nov 7th; the final exam will be scheduled during the exam period by the Registrar's office.

Final Grade Calculations: Each test is worth 30% of your final grade; the final is worth 40% of your final grade (30+30+40=100)

Your final grade will be converted to a letter grade, according to the following scheme:
