**Overview:** The course is intended to provide an overview of theory and research in areas of atypical physical, behavioural, and emotional development in children, including topics related to developmental disability, perceptual or cognitive handicap, and behavioural and socio-emotional disorders. The course will include lecture materials drawn from the literature, videos, and various laboratory studies and guests presented in class.

This class will meet on Mondays and Thursdays from 3:30 pm - 4:20 pm and Tuesdays from 4:30 pm – 5:20 pm in room ITB – AB 102. Please note that the instructor cannot return long distance telephone calls. Accordingly, please use email or visit during available office hours.

**Evaluation:** Evaluation will be based on two in-class examinations, **three concept short written assignments**, three concept quizzes and a cumulative final examination. The format of the exams will be multiple choice and short answer /fill in the blank.

The in-class examinations and quizzes will be administered during regular class times as noted on the reverse page. At the discretion of the course instructor, requests for post-exam changes to scores on particular test items may result in a full remarking of the exam. No make-up exams or quizzes will be available - missed exams will result in a recalculation of the midterm and final exam grade weighting – **missed quizzes will result in the forfeit of the grade.**

Short concept written assignments will be one or two page written assignments that ask the student to review or discuss material that reinforces content raised in class. There will be 3 concept written assignments due at set dates in the course (see below). The final examination will be **CUMULATIVE**, and the date will be set and announced by the registrar.
