Course Objectives

The goals of the course are to familiarize students with the nature and scope of forensic psychology, to describe some of the specific responsibilities and activities of forensic psychologists, and to explore the theory and empirical evidence that guide forensic psychologists in their work within the legal system.

Evaluations

1) Avenue Quizzes – 10% of Final Grade

Five short quizzes will be made available online via Avenue on certain Wednesdays throughout the term. These quizzes are not cumulative and cover material from the lectures (not textbook readings) since the last quiz. Students are expected to complete these quizzes before the start of the lecture on the following Monday (see schedule below).

2) Midterm Test – 30% of Final Grade – Wednesday July 12

The midterm test will be held at the beginning of the regularly scheduled meeting on Wednesday July 12 and will cover lectures 1–7 and the corresponding textbook readings.

3) Assignment – 15% of Final Grade – Wednesday July 19

The requirements for this assignment are described in detail in a separate document. Students will read and critically evaluate a scientific research article.

4) Final Examination – 45% of Final Grade – Wednesday August 2

The cumulative final examination will be held during the regularly scheduled meeting on Wednesday August 2 and will cover all lectures and textbook readings, with emphasis on material not previously tested.

General Policies

Students are expected to attend lecture regularly. Some information that is not available in assigned readings will be given in lectures, and vice versa. Lecture slides will be posted online; however, they may not contain all information presented in lecture. Students are responsible for both lecture material and assigned readings.

The midterm test can only be written at the time indicated, so plan to attend. There can normally be no make-up tests or special sessions for any student. If you are absent from the university for a minor medical reason, you may report your absence without documentation, using the McMaster Student Absence Form (MSAF). Absences for a longer duration or for other reasons must be reported to your Faculty or Program office, with documentation, and relief from term work may not necessarily be granted. When using the MSAF, report your absence to polloctj@mcmaster.ca within two working days. You then may be granted relief for the missing course evaluation component as described below. Please note that the MSAF may not be used for the midterm test or the final examination. If absence from a midterm test is approved, the final examination will be reweighted to 75% of the final grade. If absence from the assignment deadline is approved, an extension will be granted on a case-by-case basis. No penalties will be applied to assignments submitted late with approval. Assignments submitted late without approval will be administered a 10% penalty per day, including weekends and holidays. The tests and examination may consist of questions in diverse formats, including true-false, multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions, at the instructor's discretion. Grades will be assigned according to the following convention: 90-100% = A+, 85-89% = A, 80-84% = A-, 77-79% = B+, 73-76% = B, 70-72% = B-, 67-69% = C+, 63-66% = C, 60-62% = C-, 57-59% = D+, 53-56% = D, 50-52% = D-, 0-49% = F. Appeal procedures for grading of the midterm tests and assignments are strictly structured and involve a written submission with a deadline approximately one week following the return of graded tests and assignments in class, as will be explained by the instructor.

The instructor and university reserve the right to modify elements of the course during the term. The university may change the dates and deadlines for any courses in extreme circumstances. If either type of modification becomes necessary, reasonable notice and communication with the students will be given with explanation and the opportunity to comment on changes. It is the responsibility of the student to check their McMaster email and the Avenue course page frequently during the term and to note any changes.
